## ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1865.

In 1865 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon, as follows:—

I—A partial Eclipse of the Moon, April 10th and 11th, visible as follows: beginning 10th, 10h. 49m., evening. Greatest eclipse 10th, 11h. 42m., evening. Eclipse ends 11th, 0h. 34m., morning. Duration 1h. 45m. Magnitude, 2.04 digits or about one-fifth of the moon's diameter, on the northern limb.

II—A total Eclipse of the Sun, April 25th, not visible in the United States, but visible south of Central America and in the Atlantic Ocean, between South America and Africa. Time of conjunction 9h. morning.

III—A partial Eclipse of the Moon, October 4, partly visible, as follows: beginning at 4h. 43m. afternoon. Greatest eclipse 5h. 44m., evening. Eclipse ends 6h. 45m., evening. Duration 2h. 1m. Magnitude 4.104 digits or a little more than one-third of the Moon's diameter, on the southern limb.

IV—An annular Eclipse of the Sun, October 19, visible as follows: beginning 9h. 15m., morning. Greatest eclipse 10h. 41m., morning. Eclipse ends 0h. 5m., afternoon. Duration 2h. 4m. Magnitude 3 3-4 digits or nearly one-third of the Sun's diameter, on the southern limb.

## EVENING AND MORNING STARS.

Venus will be Evening Star until May 6, then Morning Star to the end of the year. Mars will be Evening Star until October 28, then Morning Star to the end of the year. Jupiter will be Morning Star until June 14, then Evening Star to the end of the year. Saturn will be Morning Star until April 16th, then Evening Star until October 29d, then Morning Star to the end of the year.

## RATES OF POSTAGE.

[Under the Act of Congress approved March 3d, 1863, to take effect July 1st, 1863.]

1.—LETTERS. For each half ounce or fraction thereof, in the United States, including those to and from California by Steamer or otherwise, 3 cents.

2.—NEWSPAPERS, &c. *Weekly, within the County where published, 1 copy to each actual subscriber, Free. In the county oftener than weekly, and out of the county, weekly 5 cts. per quarter; Semi-weekly 10; Tri-weekly 15; Daily (Sundays excepted) 30 cents, and so on; the rates being based upon 5 cents per quarter for 1 copy of each day's issue. Newspapers and other publications issued less frequently than once a week, to actual subscribers, 1 cent for each 4 ounces or less. Small Newspapers sent in packages to one address, same rates.*

Payment to be made in advance on all publications for not less than 1 quarter nor more than 1 year.

3.—BOOKS. For each weight of 4 ounces or fraction thereof 4 cents.

4.—UNSEALED CIRCULARS. For each three or less, 2 cents. [A printed business card on the envelop or wrapper does not subject the package (as it formerly did) to letter postage.]

5.—Transient Newspapers, Periodicals, and other printed matter (except books and unsealed circulars,) seeds, cuttings, roots, bulbs and scions, photographs, blanks, maps, engravings, envelops, paper, flexible patterns, samples and sample cards, ~~and~~ book manuscripts and proof sheets, whether corrected (marked for correction) or not, ~~and~~ for each 4 ounces or fraction thereof, 2 cents.

6.—Letters to and from the British provinces, 10 cents, prepaid or not, at option, except to Newfoundland, which must be prepaid.

7.—Publishers may inclose in their publications bills to subscribers, and advise them of the termination of

their subscriptions, Free. They may also exchange one copy of their publications with each other to the weight of one pound.

8.—If a letter or other matter is not sufficiently prepaid, double the balance due is charged to the receiver.

9.—Letters from soldiers, sailors or marines in the service of the United States, may be sent without prepayment; but they must be indorsed as such, by a staff or commanding officer in the detachment to which the writer belongs, or by a surgeon or chaplain of an hospital. Letters of commissioned officers do not come within this provision.

10.—Persons wishing to prepay postage in money, when the office is closed, can put the money (as well as the mail matter,) in a separate envelop and mark it "Postage inclosed,"

11.—Fee on registered letters 20 cts., and the receipt of the receiving party will be returned to the sender, without extra fee.

12.—All mail matter charged with less than letter postage (except seeds) must be sent in a cover or wrapper open at the ends or sides; must have no writing on it except the direction; and must have no other inclosure in it; otherwise it will be charged with letter postage.

13.—LETTER CARRIERS are nominated by postmasters and appointed by the post master general in the postal districts where the public service seems to demand them. The carrier has a salary, and delivers letters, &c. without fee from the receiver.

14.—When papers sent by publishers are not claimed during 1 month, the postmaster must advise the office from which they are sent, and that office must inform the publisher.

15.—Printed matter remaining in the office unclaimed during three months is sold for the benefit of the department.

16.—Letters may be sent in any vessel or steamboat from a port in or out of the United States, to any port in the United States, to be placed in the post office at that port, for transmission or delivery; and double rates are charged in those cases.
