The records show that one J. L. Horne (Horn), name not found as Joshua L. Horn (Horne), private of a company known at various times as Captain Bradley's Company and Company F, Maul's Texas Legion, and Company B, 2d Infantry Battalion, Maul's Texas Legion, Confederate States Army. He enlisted 28 April 1862 at Fairfield. He was born in Alabama and was 20 years of age at time of enlistment. His place of residence is shown as Frestone County.

Union prisoner of war records show that he was captured 4 July 1863 at Vicksburg, Mississippi and was paroled 9 July 1863 at that place.

The company muster roll for January and February 1864, shows the following remark: "Name dropped from the Muster Roll by order of Col. B. Timmons, left on the East Side of the Miss. River." No later record of him has been found.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN, KNOW YE THAT:

I J. L. Hearn a private of Co B. 2nd ^{Regt} Miss. Legion
Volts, C. S. A., being a prisoner of War, in the hands of the United States Forces, in virtue
of the capitulation of the City of Vicksburg and its Garrison, by Lieut. Gen. John C. Pem-
berton, C. S. A., Commanding, on the 4th day of July, 1863, do in pursuance of the terms
of said capitulation, give this my solemn parole under oath—

That I will not take up arms again against the United States, nor serve in any military
police or constabulary force in any Fort, garrison or field work, held by the Confederate
States of America, against the United States of America, nor as guard of prisons, depots or
stores, nor discharge any duties usually performed by Officers or soldiers, against the United
States of America, until duly exchanged by the proper authorities.
