PIONEER RESIDENT EXPIRES

Charles Pairfield Dies Suddenly

This Morning.

Heart Trouble Proves Fatal to Aged Retired Farmer and Civil War Veteran.

Charles Fairfield, aged 76 years, a life-long resident of Wayne township, a veteran of the civil war and a meniber of one of Allen county's eldest families, died suddenly at 7 o'clock this morning, at his home, 644 East Pontiac street. Death was due to heart trouble and followed a brief serious illness. The decedent first became iliness. A resident of Allen county for more than three-quarters of a century, Mr., Fnirfield was born in Fort Wayne, June 6, 1841; his early home being located on what is now South Broadway. The home where he was born still stands and is situated just south of the Wabash tracks, on Broadway. He was a son of Oliver P. Fairfield, one of the county's earliest settlers, who came to Allen county in 1825 from Maine.

In 1862 Mr. Fairfield purchased a 400-acre farm in Wayne township and he had resided on the same farm for a period of forty-eight years, coming to Fort Wayne eight years ago to make his home in this city. He retired from active work fifteen years ago. A son then took charge of the management of the farm, but throughout his years of retired life, Mr. Fairfield always took an active interest in the farm which he had lived on for nearly a half century. Only last Tuesday he made a trip to the farm and was greatly pleased with the crop outlook.

At the outbreak of the civil war, Mr. Fairfield enlisted in the union army and left Fort Wayne with Company E. infantry, the first company of soldiers to leave Fort Wayne for service in the He served with war of the rebellion. distinction throughout the war and then returned to his home in this town-
