JAMES M. FAIRFIELD.

Demise of One of Allen County's Early Pioneers.

At about 10 o'clock last night, at his home in Lake township, near Hadly, occurred the death of James M. Fairfield, one of Allen county's best known farmers. The cause of death was a complication of heart and kidney trouble. The deceased was sixty-nine years of age and came to this county in 1835, when Fort Wayne was a small village consisting of a few houses surrounded by the woods. He has lived here ever since, an industrious and worthy citizen, and has hosts of friends who will be pained to hear of his death. Besides the bereaved wife, there are of the immediately family Mrs. J. G. Zimmer, of St. Joe boulevard, this city; Mrs. Charles A. Hays, wife of the justice of the peace; Miss Edith, who lives at home; Miss Anna, principal of the Hamilton school; Mrs. Sadie Bell, of Omaha, Neb.; Miss Bertha Sheuler, of Stockton, Cal., and one son, Edward, who lives at home. Cyrus K. Fairfield, of Shawnee avenue, this city, is a brother. The funeral will be held at the Grace Reformed church on Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and at the family residence at 12 o'clock.

The deceased was the son of the late Captain Asa Fairfield, and was born in Kennebunkport, Maine.

DEATHS AND FUNERALS.

James M. Fairfield Passes Away at His Country Home.

At 8 o'clock last night occurred the death from heart failure of James M. Fairfield, at his home, near Hadley Station, this county. He was one of the best known farmers in this vicinity, having settled here many years ago, with his parents. In his early youth he was a sailor under his father, who was a sea captain previous to settling in Indiana. Mr. Fairfield had been ailing for some time past his death was not unexpected. He leaves a family of grown children, one of whom is the wife of Justice of the Peace Charles A. Hays, of Wayne township. The funeral will be held at the family residence at 12 o'clock on Monday and from Grace Reformed church at 2 o'clock.
